Synthetic phonics is a method of teaching reading that ensures all children can learn to read. Through this, children take the first important steps in learning to read. They can also use this knowledge to begin to spell new words they hear.




Early Reading at St Mary's Catholic Academy

What does reading look like at St Marys?

There are 6 skills that every child needs to be 'ready to read', and we develop those skills through a range of activities and opportunities.

- Narrative skills The ability to describe things and events and to tell and retell stories.
- **Phonological awareness** The ability to hear and play with smaller sounds in words.
- Print motivation A child's interest in, and enjoyment of books
- Vocabulary -Knowing the names of things
- Letter knowledge Learning to name letters, knowing they have sounds and recognising them everywhere
- **Print awareness** Noticing print, knowing how to handle a book, and how to follow the written words on a page.

Reading opportunities

- Every child will have a reading or storybook to take home.
- When your child is in F2 and ready to blend, they will receive a reading book from the 'Little Wandle' scheme.
- Books will be matched to the child's phonic ability for as long as necessary.
- We offer fun and engaging multi-sensory story sessions.
- Daily focused reading opportunities take place.
- Highly trained staff teach reading.
- Phonic/early reading skills workshops are offered for parents in Nursery and Reception.
- Highly resourced reading resources e.g. story sacks.
- Each class has core books which are given key focus, to enable the children to engage at a deeper level in the understanding of stories.
- Develop understanding of stories and the ability to retell them, using correct vocabulary and repeated refrains.
- Key rhymes are used to develop the skill of hearing rhythm in words
