<ul> <li>Science - Living Things and Their Habitats</li> <li>A plant has four stages to its lifecycle – seed, germination, seedling and plant.</li> <li>Plants can reproduce sexually and asexually.</li> <li>Some plants have male and female parts so they can reproduce.</li> <li>Most animals reproduce sexually to pass on their genes.</li> </ul>	Germination, fertilisation, filament, receptacle, ovary, ovule, sepal, style
<ul> <li>Geography – Rainforests</li> <li>There are two types of rainforest – temperate and tropical.</li> <li>Tropical rainforests are located closer to the equator and temperate are found further north near coastal areas</li> <li>There are four layers in a rainforest e.g. forest floor, understory, canopy and emergent layer</li> <li>About 6% of the Earth's land surface is rainforest and this area is home to about half of all animal and plant species</li> <li>Deforestation is having a harmful impact on indigenous people, animals, plants and our world as a whole</li> <li>Indigenous people face many threats such as: farming, disease,</li> </ul>	Forest floor Understory Canopy Emergent layer Deforestation Endangered Extinction Indigenous Biodiversity

#### Homework

Please encourage your child to read and to practise their times tables and related division facts for 5 minutes each day.

It is essential that your child is reading every single evening and that they are practising their times tables and spellings. It is important that you continue to listen to your child read and discuss what they have read as often as possible and record this in their reading diaries. We also encourage children to write their own comments in their reading diaries.

The children have access to a wide selection of books in school and online where they can access their MyOn library (see reading diaries for password), and we encourage children to read a variety of genres and both fiction and non-fiction texts. They can also read other books you might have at home or choose at the library. You will find a bookmark in their reading diary that will help you to question your child at their correct reading stage.
