This template can be used for multiple purposes:

- It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sport premium
- It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sport premium
- It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spend, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

Schools must use the funding to make **additional and sustainable improvements** to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offers.

The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school's core budget should fund these. Further detail on capital expenditure can be found in the updated [Primary PE and sport premium guidance](#).

The Primary PE and sport premium guidance, outlines 5 key priorities that funding should be used towards. It is not



necessary that spending has to meet all the key priorities, you should select the priorities that you aim to use any funding towards.

Although completing this template is not a requirement for schools, schools are required to publish details of how they spend this funding. Schools must also outline what the impact this funding has had on pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment and how any spending will be sustainable in the future. **All funding must be spent by 31st July 2024.**

The Department for Education has worked closely with the Association for Physical Education (afPE) and the Youth Sport Trust (YST) to develop this template and encourages schools to use it. This template is an effective way of meeting the reporting requirements of the Primary PE and sport premium.

Swimming Data

Meeting National Curriculum requirements for swimming and water safety.

Priority should always be given to ensuring that pupils can perform safe self-rescue even if they do not fully meet the first two requirements of the National Curriculum programme of study

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	70%	<i>We have had to limit the number of pupils attending swimming lessons to one year group due to cost of transport to the pool. We were not able to use our usual, local pool this year. Fortunately, many of this year's cohort have swimming lessons outside of school which has impacted the percentage this year.</i>
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	60%	<i>Although we have a good percentage of children swimming 25m, not all of them are competent at swimming a range of strokes.</i>

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	90%	<i>3 children feel that they wouldn't be confident in the water.</i>
If your schools swimming data is below national expectation, you can choose to use the Primary PE and sport premium to provide additional top-up sessions for those pupils that did not meet National Curriculum requirements after the completion of core lessons. Have you done this?	No	<i>We have struggled this year to achieve a successful booking slot at our local pool which we can walk to and avoid transport costs. Transport costs to alternative pools are expensive. We have secured pool times in local pool for next academic year. We will take up Top up sessions if necessary for Y6 next year.</i>
Have you provided CPD to improve the knowledge and confidence of staff to be able to teach swimming and water safety?	No	<i>We use the pool's swimming instructors for lessons. Staff who attend, use this as a CPD opportunity. From staff voice, relevant staff feel confident to take on the role of instructor where necessary. We have a comprehensive scheme of work if needed as back up.</i>
